A BRIEF HISTORY...

Formed in 2018, Durham Corinthians compete in the Wearside League Division One and play their home games at New Ferens Park, Belmont.

The club formed to play at New Ferens Park at the start of the 2018/19 season and initially played as Durham United FC, in the Wearside League Development Division, which is now known as Division Two.

Current Manager Dean Smith led the team to three cup finals and finished runners-up in that inaugural season, winning promotion to the first division at their first attempt while also winning the Clem Smith Trophy and the Washington Aged Miner's Cup.

Now becoming Durham Corinthians, the club were competing in Division One for the first time, but the 2019/20 season was curtailed by the Coronavirus pandemic which saw Durham 11th in the table when the season was halted.

Durham Corinthians Reserves formed at the start of that season under manager John Bell who at the end of that season joined Smith and Paul Taylor as a coach in the senior side's management team.

The 2020/21 season was a huge success for Durham Corinthians who finished fourth in Division One having been able to play the full season without feeling the effects of the Coronavirus pandemic.

That season also saw Durham lift the Durham FA Trophy as they beat Darlington Town at Heritage Park, Bishop Auckland's home ground. Durham staged a dramatic comeback after being 1-0 down to then win the game 2-1 and earn their first piece of silverware in four years.

The club currently still play at New Ferens Park and are competing in their second full season in the Wearside League Division One under the management of Smith.

The club have again applied for promotion into the Northern League for next season showing their continued ambition to play at a higher level.

Having said that, I think Nick Pope's handball last week was an instinctive reaction, but rules have to be black and white where possible. Newcastle's "punishment" extended beyond the Liverpool game to the League Cup Final as their first three choices for keeper are ruled out (and Marcus Rashford on fire). Nevertheless, we wish them the best and hope and hope they bring the trophy back to the North East tomorrow.

They will still be coming here with plenty of confidence after sneaking a close and competitive game at the university earlier in the season. As always, we will be mindful of that.

Durham Corinthians are set to host Durham United in the Durham Derby at New Ferens Park this afternoon.

This is just the second time the two clubs have ever faced each other, with Durham United defeating Dean Smith's side 4-3 at Maiden Castle back in October.

Smith's side have won their last seven games in a row in the Wearside League and are unbeaten in their last 10 league fixtures.

In their last five fixtures, Durham United have won three and lost two with their most recent fixture being a 5-0 home victory against Durham City on Wednesday.

Durham Corinthians currently sit fourth in the Wearside League Division One table with the Belmont-based club looking to close the gap on third placed FC Hartlepool and second placed Gateshead Leam Rangers.

With just five points separating the two sides today, a win for both clubs would be vital as Durham United look to close that five point gap to just two points and climb into the top four.

With both Smith and assistant manager John Bell unable to attend today's fixture, Craig Cowell will be in the dug out this afternoon and will look to top goal scorer Dan Weaver to be the difference between the two sides.

Fresh from a last minute win against Windscale midweek, Durham Corinthians travelled to Brinkburn Road to take on Darlington Railway Athletic.

The two sides had already met twice this season with one win apiece, and this meeting would turn out to be an evenly contested affair with little between the two sides.

Dean Smith shuffled his pack with Callum Rowell, Kieron Richardson, Dan Weaver and Steven Telford coming into the starting line-up.

It was Durham Corinthians who came out the blocks the fastest with the first chance falling to Jake Robinson who leapt to meet a Tom Young corner but was only able to direct his header wide of the right hand upright.

On the ten minute mark it was Tom Young who looked to test the RA keeper but his low left foot shot flew wide of the post. Young was clearly in the mood as five minutes later he had another attempt at goal, this time a dipping shot on the bounce that flew just over the cross bar.

The Corinthians pressure soon told and it was a fantastic team goal as goalkeeper Renwick split the opposition press with a low ball to Kieron Richardson. Richardson dribbled infield and found Tom Young in space. Young drove forward with the ball before playing a one two with

Weaver and driving in to the box. Young pulled the ball back in to the path of Richardson who had continued his run, and he stroked the ball home first time to give Durham Corinthians the lead.

This jolted the hosts in to action and Harry Renwick was called in to action for the first time to parry a low shot from distance. Darlington RA continued to press before the break but were unable to break through a resolute visiting defence.

The second half started in a similar vain with the hosts pushing forward looking to get back in the game, but the Corinthians back line holding firm. Both teams made numerous substitutions and the game was littered with bookings as things turned scrappy on the pitch.

Durham Corinthians did have the ball in the net again in the 82nd minute but the goal was ruled out after the referee saw some pushing and shoving in the build up.

Darlington RA had one last push forward in search of an equaliser but they were unable to breach the stoic Corinthians back line and the referee blew up on exactly 90 minutes to loud cheers from the visiting dugout.

A last minute winner from Dan Weaver earned Durham Corinthians their sixth victory in a row on Wednesday.

The midfielder's eleventh goal of the campaign at the death made the difference against Windscale on an entertaining evening at New Ferens Park.

Durham twice came from behind through club captain Max Stoker's header and Matthew Smith's second half penalty on the way to earning an important three points and extending the unbeaten run to nine games.

The match started slowly with Durham struggling to get into the game and playing largely on the back foot. After just thirteen minutes, Durham were forced into an early substitution when Harry Spence was replaced by Adam Morley after picking up a knock.

Moments later, Windscale opened the scoring through Matt Sempill as they broke down the left flank and crossed the ball into the striker who made no mistake with the finish, calmly slotting the ball home.

Durham had a chance to equalise when the ball fell to Smith in the box, but he was unable to steer his effort on target.

On the stroke of half-time, captain Stoker showed his experience by rising high above all players and heading home the resulting corner and equalising for his side.

After the restart, Windscale took the lead for the second time of the evening following some sloppy defending by Durham. The goal came through Ross Leeson who finished off a period of play that started on the right wing to give the visitors a 2-1 lead.

The home side were awarded a penalty when Arthurs was clearly fouled by Studholme in the area, and the referee pointed to the spot.

It was Smith who stepped up to take, and made no mistake by converting the spot kick low and hard to the keeper's right hand post, levelling proceedings going into the final twenty minutes.

Goalkeeper Renwick pulled off an excellent acrobatic save to deny Jolly in the next chance of the half, tipping the ball over the crossbar denying a certain goal.

Just as the game was approaching injury time, Durham Corinthians grabbed the winner as Weaver notched his eighth league goal of the season. Visiting goalkeeper Studholme made an instinctive initial save to keep out Young, but Weaver pounced upon the follow-up.

The referee blew the final whistle after a nervy five minutes stoppage time which included a high Windscale pressing play, but Durham held on for the vital win sending the Cumbrian visitors home with nothing.

In 2018, Durham United formed a senior team for the first time playing in the Wearside League.

Durham United achieved promotion into the Wearside League Division One last season after finishing second place.

Ahead of the 2022/23 Wearside League campaign, Durham United launched a partnership with Durham University's Team Durham.

This saw the university team don the Durham United colours and take part in the Wearside League Division One.

The partnership would also see Durham United play their home fixtures at the £30m Maiden Castle Sport and Wellbeing complex.

Durham United are thriving in their first season in the top division of the Wearside League with the club currently sixth.

The club announced earlier this year that they have applied for promotion into the Northern League.

THE CUP WIN...

Almost a year ago, Durham Corinthians won their first piece of silverware lifting the Durham FA Trophy under their new name after defeating Darlington Town at Bishop Auckland's Heritage Park on the 13th March 2022. So, let's look back at Durham's momentous achievement...



A Kieron Richardson equaliser and a screamer from Matthew Smith staged a dramatic comeback after going 1-0 down to 2-1 up and sealed the final for the Belmont-based club in the relentless rain, with club captain Max Stoker lifting the 133-year-old trophy.

It was the first cup Durham Corinthians had won as a Wearside League first division team, and came up against their promotion rivals who took the lead in the second minute.

Dean Smith's side took some time to recover from the early blow after Darlington opened the score-line with the first attack of the game and Steve Johnson was allowed to slip the ball past Durham keeper Matty Wilkinson in the first goalmouth scramble of a game, which was full of them.

Wilkinson immediately made some amends with a brilliant one-handed save from Jim Wilson's curling free-kick at the edge of the penalty area after Dan Weaver and Lewis Rees had squandered a couple of half chances on the difficult surface which took a pounding from rain and wind for almost the entire 90 minutes.

The Durham keeper then made another important stop to deny Darlington centre forward James Beauchamp after his namesake Joe Wilkinson had lost possession outside the box and Harry Spence cleared the danger.

The sides almost headed into the break level but for an excellent save from Darlington keeper Chris Charlton who managed to claw a teasing effort from Matthew Smith to safety after the

Durham midfielder had launched a looping shot goal-ward from Weaver's pass.

Durham's top scorer Kieron Richardson changed the course of the game after another difficult start to the second period, within nine minutes of the re-start, when he steamed into the Darlington area and thumped Tom Young's cross past Charlton from close range through the goalmouth mud for his 13th goal of the season.

And they went ahead just after the hour when Smith attempted another 20 yard shot, this time with the outside of his right boot and his shot flew over Charlton and into the roof of the net.

Although Darlington had one goal ruled out for offside, Durham were more than a match for the late onslaught as both sides made late substitutions with Steven Telford, Ross Tottle and Ryan Bolam all playing important roles, and Cam Arthurs and Marcus Pearce just missing out on the action.

Tottle went close at one end and made a vital block at the other, while Joe Wilkinson also made a crucial clearance in the area in the dying minutes and Matty Wilkinson somehow pulled off a close range reflex save from his goal-line to deny Declan Brown.

That stop helped clinch the Durham Trophy – first won in 1890 by Southwick – for Durham Corinthians and was confirmed when South Shields referee David Carr – who had an excellent game – blew the final whistle.

FOOTBALL IN DURHAM

Durham. A captivating city with breathtaking views, prestigious history and beautiful landmarks.

From the Norman Conquest, the English Civil Wars to two World Wars, Durham has had a big part to play in British and worldwide culture.

Situated between Sunderland and Newcastle, the city holds over 50,000 residents with 86,000 people also living in the County of Durham, with County Durham being up there with some of the biggest counties in the United Kingdom.

Durham has one of the best Universities in the world being ranked in the top 100 universities across the globe. Students from many different continents travel to the city in search of further education, not to mention the 20 million tourists the city welcomed back in 2017 and the three million people who visit each year to take in our culture.

From Durham Cathedral and Durham Castle to it's bars, night life and beautiful scenery Durham a fantastic place to visit.

Just up the road in Stanley, you can almost travel back in time to the 1820's and 1900s with the worlds most famous open air museum, Beamish. It gives a real sense of what it would be like to in those times living in the Durham area, a time where football in Durham was arguably at its peak!

Football in England, and the North East region especially, is a huge part of our culture, with the city of Durham having a small part to play in it. How you may ask? Well, to answer that question we have to look back to pre-world war two.

In 1921, Durham City were in the football league, battling against the likes of Hartlepool United, Darlington FC and Tranmere Rovers in the old third division north.

Durham City were later relegated during the 1927-28 season after finishing bottom, failing to be re-elected and instead were replaced by now League Two promotion chasers Carlisle United - with The Citizens never returning to their former football league glory.

The Citizens old ground Ferens Park once hosted a FA Cup second round match against Tranmere in front of a crowd of over 7,000 people back in 1957 in what finished a 3-0 defeat for The Citizens.

Although since then, Durham City have fallen down the divisions, Durham Women have thrived as a young upcoming club based in the Durham area and are the current highest ranked team.

Playing at Maiden Park, Durham Women play in the Women's second division, going face to face with Sunderland Ladies in what are fierce matches in the 'River Wear Derby'.

The Women's team recently hosted Women's Super League giants Manchester United in the League cup where they defeated The Red Devils on penalties in a thrilling encounter in front of a record crowd for the club.

In the Men's game, Durham Corinthians are currently the highest ranked club out of the other two Durham clubs in the Wearside League Division One, with Durham Corinthians sitting fourth at the time of writing, newly promoted Durham United sixth and The Citizens bottom of the Wearside League.

After only being able to finish a full season after three years last season, Durham Corinthians finished fourth in the Wearside League Division One and won silverware almost a year ago when the Belmont-based club staged a dramatic comeback against Darlington Town to win the Durham FA Trophy at Bishop Auckland's Heritage Park.

Achieving promotion from the Wearside League Second Division last season, Durham United are currently thriving with life in the top division of the Wearside League - having finish second last season and now find themselves just a few points away from entering the top five.

Durham United recently agreed a partnership with Durham University's Team Durham. The partnership would see the University's Team Durham lead out the new look Durham United into their first ever Wearside League Division One campaign.

Both Durham Corinthians and Durham United both look to be promoted from the division into the Northern League next season, in what looks to be a progressive and exciting time for football in Durham.

THE REAL RACE TO THE FOOTBALL LEAGUE

As the business end of the football season approaches, there are some fascinating title races shaping up across the divisions.

Will Arsenal be able to hold off the two Manchester clubs? Can Sheffield Wednesday climb back in to the Championship at the second attempt? Will it be a second Wearside League title in a row for Darlington Town or can Leam Rangers, FC Hartlepool, Norton & Stockton or even your very own Durham Corinthians claim the title?

Perhaps the most fascinating title battle lies just outside the Football League, and with a cast that includes Hollywood superstars and the world's oldest professional football club. The National League, formerly the Conference, or the Vauxhall Conference for fans of a certain vintage, currently sees two former Football League clubs going blow for blow.

Backed by the millions of Ryan Reynolds and Rob McElhenney, Wrexham literally the Disney story, with their story being told in the sports documentary *Welcome to Wrexham*. With series two in the pipeline and an FA Cup run bringing additional revenue and limelight, the growth of the North Wales club is exponential. Wrexham have a grand old history, including substantial European pedigree by way of eight seasons in the Cup Winners Cup. These campaigns welcomed Anderlecht, Porto, Roma, Real Zaragoza and Manchester United to the Racecourse Ground before a change in UEFA regulations put an end to this backdoor to continental football.

As told in the documentary, the club suffered a steady decline and were relegated out of the Football League in 2008. Numerous attempts at promotion were thwarted and owners with less than scrupulous intentions were removed from the club. In 2011 the Wrexham Supporters' took over the running of the club, and held stewardship until the blockbuster takeover. In November

2020 Reynolds and McElhenney saw their takeover offer approved by over 98% of the Supporters' Trust and the formalities were completed in February 2021.

It was assumed that with their financial firepower the Red Dragons would breeze to promotion, but it was Stockport County who won the 2021/22 title leaving Wrexham with a home play off game against another former league club Grimsby Town.

In a scarcely believable encounter the Welsh side lost the game 5-4, and whilst it made entertaining viewing in the documentary, it meant fifteenth consecutive season outside the Football League.

Notts County have been outside of the top four divisions for a lot less time, but will still feel they are a Football League club at heart. Relegated in 2019 for the first time in their 157 year history, the Meadow Lane outfit have made the National League playoffs in each campaign, last season losing to the same Grimsby side that would go on to beat Wrexham and claim promotion.

County were often the answer to a quiz question in relation to their formation and history, although a Crystal Palace fan might tell you differently. They sharp realised that the National League shows no respect for history with more than half the teams this season having previous Football League pedigree.

County recruited well ahead of this campaign, raiding Gateshead for the striking pair of Macculey Langstaff and Cedwyn Scott. Scott made his way to Notts County via Dunston UTS and Hebburn Town via a trial at Premier League Newcastle United. His 24 goals in Gateshead's promotion from the National League North put him on the radar of Football League clubs but he made the move to Nottinghamshire ahead of this campaign.

Macculey Langstaff's rise would itself be worthy of a documentary, having turned out in the Wearside League

for Stockton Town at the age of 17 following his release from Middlesbrough.

Langstaff would move through the leagues, bagging 31 goals for Billingham Synthonia in the Northern League before moves to York City and Gateshead. Langstaff is currently the top scorer in the National League and has scored more domestic goals than Erling Haaland this season.



With Wrexham adding to their strong squad and retaining the services of talisman Paul Mullin they were expected to ease to the title, but it is Notts County who sit top of the league albeit having played two games more than Wrexham. If Wrexham win their two games in hand, they would sit one point above County. As both clubs know to their detriment, the National League only has one automatic promotion place and only twice in the last eight seasons has the team that finished second been promoted through the playoffs.

The two clubs are clear of third place and if they continue to pick up points as they have been, could feasibly both finish on more than 111 points, ten more than the National League record held by Cheltenham Town.

It could be well that the deciding factor in this thrilling race is the meeting of the two clubs on Easter Monday at the Racecourse Ground. It is all still to play for in this thrilling battle between two grand old clubs.
